Pope Francis: Russian war in Ukraine was 'perhaps provoked'

Pontiff echoes his previous controversial remarks about NATO expansion facilitating the Kremlin's invasion.

In an interview published Tuesday, Pope Francis said Russia's war in Ukraine was "perhaps somehow either provoked or not prevented" — controversial remarks that will raise eyebrows internationally.


He made the remarks $\underline{\text{during an interview}}$ with Jesuit magazine La Civiltà Cattolica conducted in mid-May but published Tuesday.

"Someone may say to me at this point: but you are pro-Putin! No, I am not," Francis said. "It would be simplistic and wrong to say such a thing. I am simply against reducing complexity to the distinction between good guys and bad guys, without reasoning about roots and interests, which are very complex."

The pope also recalled a conversation he had before the war with an unnamed head of state
— a "wise man" — who told Francis he was concerned about NATO and Russia.

"He said, 'They are barking at the gates of Russia. The situation could lead to war," the pope said. "That head of state was able to read the signs of what was happening."

In Aug 2022, Francis described the killing of Alexander Dugin's daughter, Darya Dugina, as "a case of innocents paying for the Russo-Ukrainian War". Ukraine criticized this, stating that Dugina was "one of ideologists of (Russian) imperialism" and not an innocent victim.



In Nov 2022, Francis gave an interview to Christian magazine called America. When asked about his "seeming unwillingness to directly criticize Russia," and why he was "preferring instead to speak more generally of the need for an end to war, an end to mercenary activity...

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Gerard O'Connell: Holy Father, about Ukraine: Many in the United States have been confused by your seeming unwillingness to directly criticize Russia for its aggression against Ukraine, preferring instead to speak more generally of the need for an end to war, an end to mercenary activity rather than Russian attacks, and to the traffic in arms. How would you explain your position on this war to Ukrainians, or Americans and others who support Ukraine?

When I speak about Ukraine, I speak of a people who are martyred. If you have a martyred people, you have someone who martyrs them. When I speak about Ukraine, I speak about the cruelty because I have much information about the cruelty of the troops that come in. Generally, the cruelest are perhaps those who are of Russia but are not of the Russian tradition, such as the Chechens, the Buryati and so on. Certainly, the one who invades is the Russian state. This is very clear. Sometimes I try not to specify so as not to offend and rather condemn in general, although it is well known whom I am condemning. It is not necessary that I put a name and surname.


These utterly racist remarks reduced the Kremlin's responsibility on the atrocities in Ukraine, maybe somehow suggesting that the soldiers from the big cities don't commit any war crimes. He's also pondered whether it's "right for Western powers to arm Ukraine."

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In the interviews, he also pondered whether it's right for Western powers to arm Ukraine, explaining he had been trying to assess the roots of the conflict and the reasons pushing Putin to engage in such brutal warfare. "I have no way of telling whether his rage has been provoked," he wondered aloud, "but I suspect it was maybe facilitated by the West's attitude."

In Aug 2023, the Pope sent a video greeting to the All-Russian Meeting of Catholic Youth in St Petersburg. During the speech, he addressed the youth by saying that "You are the descendants of great Russia: the great Russia of Saints, rulers, the great Russia of Peter I,...

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


Pope Francis's <u>video speech</u> to the All-Russian Meeting of Catholic Youth in St Petersburg, urging them to "not forget their heritage" has caused quite a stir. What struck a bitter chord internationally – and especially in Ukraine – about the remarks he delivered on August 25 was not so much its religious contents, but its tone-deaf praise of the heritage of "Mother Russia", which he urged his listeners to never give up.

The positive invocation of Russia's imperial legacies, has been regularly used as a <u>historical justification</u> for the military invasion of Ukraine. So it now feels particularly insensitive – and somewhat unaware of the politicisation of religion in Russia's imperial and present-day discourses.

..Catherine II, that empire – educated, great culture and great humanity." These legacies have often been used by Putin as a justification for his brutal war in Ukraine, and it's yet another tone-deaf statement from Francis regarding the war in Ukraine.



Francis' efforts to bring Russia closer to the Vatican began already in Feb 2016, when he met with Russia's Patriarch Kirill in Havana, Cuba. This was the first time leaders of the Catholic Church and the Moscow Patriarchate met, ...

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... and it was a big propaganda win for both Kirill and the Kremlin. At this time, Russia was already waging war in both Syria and in Ukraine, and some considered this meeting to "indirectly give a boost to Mr. Putin," and his imperialistic war efforts.

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For Francis, the meeting was an ecumenical and diplomatic coup that eluded his predecessors but that also opened him to criticism that his embrace of the Russian patriarch would indirectly give a boost to Mr. Putin as he wages a war in Syria and continues to meddle in Ukraine.

In Moscow, the Russian news media made little effort to hide the government's role in enabling the historic encounter. In an editorial this week, Vedomosti, a business newspaper, said, "The meeting would not be possible if the interests of the Russian Orthodox Church did not coincide with those of the Kremlin."

It is of course common knowledge that Patriarch Kirill AKA Vladimir Mikhailovich Gundyayev is not the holiest of men. In fact he used to be part of the KGB. Also, his fortune is estimated to be around 4

billion USD, and he owns a lavish palace in Gelendzhik.

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Most of Kirill's wealth came through corruption, when his church was given a privilege for duty-free importation of cigarettes during the 90s.

Many Westerners know little about the new Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church Father Kirill. Many Russians know him as a great orator and a host of a weekly TV show "Pastor's Word." However, very few know that Kirill (Vladimir Gundyaev by passport), a billionaire and a former KGB operative, made his fortune in tobacco, alcohol, and oil sales. His activities were among the main reasons why not-for-profits in Russia lost tax-deductible status. The new Orthodox leader is fond of playing with stocks, car racing, downhill skiing, and breeding exclusive kinds of dogs. He owns villas in Switzerland and a penthouse with a view of the Cathedral of Christ the Savior in Moscow.

Kirill graduated with honors from Leningrad Spiritual Academy in 1969. In 1970, he earned his master's degree, and after several minor positions was appointed a personal secretary to Mitropolit Nikodim, chief of the external church relations. Since that moment, Kirill became the face of the Orthodox Church in all foreign trips to Western Europe. According to vlasti.net website, Kirill's colleagues and competitors linked all his travels to his work for the Soviet KGB where he was known by nickname "Mikhailov." Starting in 1972, Kirill/Gundyaev/Mikhailov became more involved with the countries of the Middle East. In 1975, at a forum in Nairobi, he defended the Soviet Union and downplayed dissidents' letters by making historic claims that people of faith were not persecuted and there were no human rights abuses based on religion in the Soviet Union.

To be fair, Francis has also strongly condemned the war on many occasions. He's warned pro-war Kirill to not become "Putin's altar boy", he's stated that Ukraine has "a lawful right to defend itself." But these statements became irrelevant after the Pope praised Russia's..



Kremlin welcomes Pope's words urging youth to maintain, uphold Russia's historical legacy

MOSCOW, August 29. /TASS/. The Kremlin has lauded a statement by Pope Francis on the heritage of Great Russia, which strongly resonates with the positions of the Russian state and society, Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

On August 25, the pontiff spoke online to attendees of the National Meeting of Catholic Youth of Russia being held in St. Petersburg, urging the audience not to forget the historical legacy and heritage of Great Russia, mentioning such rulers as Peter the Great and Catherine the Great.

"The Pope knows Russian history, and that is very good. [Our history] is quite deep; its roots go very deep," Peskov said, noting that this heritage is not limited to 18th-century sovereigns Peter I and Catherine II, but "is much older." According to the Kremlin spokesman, the government, public associations, schoolteachers and university instructors are now engaged precisely in "transmitting this heritage to our young people on a continuous basis, reminding them of it." "And the fact that the pontiff's call is in unison with these efforts is extremely encouraging," Peskov concluded.

Pope describes arms supplies to Ukraine as political decision

According to him, the use of weapons in self-defense has a moral justification, but does not lead to peace

VATICAN, September 16. /TASS/. Arms supplies to Ukraine are a political decision, Pope Francis told reporters en route from Kazakhstan on Thursday.

In his opinion, the use of weapons for self-defense can be morally justified, but will not lead to peace.

"It is a political decision that can be accepted from the moral point of view, on the condition of being moral. There are lots of conditions <...>, but [it] would be immoral if there are intentions to provoke a greater war, to sell weapons, or get rid of weapons that are no longer needed. The morality of such an act is determined by its reasons. It is legitimate to defend oneself," the Pontiff said.

In his opinion, the concept of a 'just war' requires further consideration.

"Everyone has been talking about peace, the UN has been talking about peace for 70 years, but how many wars are being waged worldwide right now?" Pope Francis said, citing the events in Ukraine, the Armenian-Azerbaijani conflict, the Syrian conflict, the Eritrean-Ethiopian conflict and the situation with the Rohingya people in Myanmar.

In his opinion, "weapons production is the license for murder," while "if no weapons are produced for just one year, the problem of famine can be solved."

"The war in itself is pure terror, but we are breathing it in and out now. It appears that when there is no war, there is no life," the head of the Roman Catholic church said.

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
