Throughout the years – or even decades – Russia's narratives against the West have remained largely the same. Many of them date back to the Cold War era, when the KGB and CIA were bitter enemies. But since then, the media landscape has drastically changed.

KGB vs. GIA

Money, blackmail, sex-no holds are barred. Question: Who is winning this battle between Soviet and American "moles"?

With the arrest of the first, FBI agent ever accused as a Soviet spy, the public is getting a rare look at a high-stakes war being waged by two old adversaries-the espionage agencies of America and the Soviet Union.

Fought with sex, money, blackmail and even violence, this spy war has a goal that goes far beyond theft of plans for a new gun or an advanced piece of technology. The stakes are the most closely held secrets of the intelligence services whose operations are crucial to national security.

Amid a deepening chill between the superpowers, the

Amd a deepening chill between the superpowers, the prospect of penetration is an ever present concern. Both sides are waging a relentless campaign to plant operatives within one another's spy services. For America, the chief target is Moscow's Committee for State Security—the KGB. For the Kremlin, it is the Central Intelligence Agency.

In this shadow world of lies, deception, double crosses and double agents, no one can say for certain which side holds the upper hand. Both powers can lay claim to major victories, but both have suffered costly and embarrassing defeats.

For the U.S., the latest setback came from an unlikely

For the U.S., the latest setback came from an unlikely quarter—the Federal Bureau of Investigation, an agency that has long boasted a blemish-free record. Its spyproof image was shattered in October with the arrest of Richard W. Miller, 47, a 20-year FBI veteran accused of acting as an agent for the Soviet Union in the bureau's Los Angeles office.

The charge against Miller: Peddling secrets to a Soviet émigré named Svetlana Ogorodnikova, 34, a self-proclaimed

emigre named sveriana Ogrodnikova, 3-4, a sept-potanined KGB major who allegedly lured him into a personal relation-ship, then offered money for classified documents. The government claims the debt-strapped agent, married and the father of eight children, sought \$65,000 from the KGB. Although the actual damage is unclear, Miller admits to

giving Moscow a 25-page classified document that officials say would provide the KGB with a detailed picture of U.S. intelligence activities, techniques and requirements. The document did not, however, spell out names of active agents or details of current operations.

In the never ending spy war, both sides have found willing double agents. A KGB "mole" spent years working inside Britain's code-breaking center, diverting supersecret U.S. intelligence data to Moscow. America had a man inside Polish intelligence, blowing the cover on Soviet spy operations in the U.S. as recently as 1983.

CIA Director William Casey boasts that his agency last year helped give the KGB the worst setback in its history, aiding in expulsion of some 135 Soviet spies worldwide. Yet some critics in a position to know fear that U.S. services—particularly the CIA—are being placed at a disadvantage in the competition with their Soviet rivels. with their Soviet rivals.

"Today, the CIA is reluctant to mix it up with the KGB," asserts a knowledgeable U.S. official. "It's a dicey game. Lots of things can

go wrong. They are not out there in every nook and cranny trying to roll up the KGB."

Moscow's Quest for "Moles"

The prospect of a Soviet mole's burrowing into top U.S. The prospect of a Soviet mole s burrowing into top U.S. intelligence echelons has haunted America ever since the defection of H. A. R. "Kim" Philby, one of Britain's most senior intelligence officials, to Russia some 20 years ago. U.S. jitters worsened when Heinz Felfe, a senior West German counterspy, surfaced as a KGB plant in the '50s.

The CIA itself was thrown into turmoil in the late 1960s

and early 1970s by counterspy James Angleton's suspi-cions—which he never proved and which many ridiculed that a KGB operative had penetrated the upper reaches of his agency. Angleton left the ClA in 1975.

The Kremlin devotes vast resources to infiltrating other

spy services. Thousands work for the KGB, under the command of Marshal Viktor Chebrikov. Still more are employed by the military-intelligence arm known as GRU. They are supported by East European spy agencies.

By itself, the KGB is said to have 10,000 espionage officers.

By itself, the KOB is said to have I cloud esploitage difficults assigned strictly to foreign spying—including 500 in the U.S. on diplomatic missions. Says a senior FBI official wryly: "We are blessed with the best agents the KOB has to offer. They are smooth and Westernized. They cultivate relationships

are smooth and Westernized. They cultivate relationships with everyone from clerks to company presidents."

The clearest penetration of the CIA came to light in late 1980 with the arrest of David Henry Barnett, who remains the only member of the CIA's officer ranks ever to be publicly unmasked as a KGB operative.

After working under cover for the agency in Indonesia through the 1960s, Barnett, now serving 18 years in prison, resigned in 1970 to start a private business in Jakarta. In a few years his venture collapsed and financial losses mounted.

years, his venture collapsed and financial losses mounted. In 1976, Barnett—\$100,000 in debt—turned to the KGB for help. In Vienna and Jakarta, he delivered American defense information, including data about a secret CIA operation, to the KGB. He disclosed the names of Indone-



- 4) The CIA and/or "evil Anglo-Saxons" are behind every revolution & anti-Kremlin activity.







'Do international observers want to be placed in Pokrovsk?' - Zelensky criticizes calls for elections following Trump's comments

Russia pushing Ukraine elections to attempt installing a puppet government

Asked by ITV News about Russian claims that Ukraine should hold elections and that his presidency is illegitimate, Zelenskyy responded: "Who says it – Russians?" When the journalist confirmed, he stated:

"Well, first of all, I'd like to say that you're right here – the election topic is being pushed by the Russkies, and obviously, they need their person [in power in Ukraine], just anyone who is theirs."

He argued that Russia wants to control Ukraine institutionally, as it did in the past, preventing it from developing independently or joining the European Union. According to Zelenskyy, Moscow seeks to keep Ukraine as a "raw materials appendage" by exploiting its economy while suppressing its language and culture.

Suspending martial law would dismantle the army

Zelenskyy warned that if Ukraine suspends martial law to hold elections, it will be unable to maintain its wartime-sized army legally. He stated:


"If we suspend martial law, we will lose the army, and the Russkies will be happy – it's a matter of combat readiness, morale, and everything else. You lose that, and legally, you can no longer maintain such an army. That's a fact."

Second, Trump and his allies have criticized media censorship in Ukraine. In reality, Ukraine shut down outlets owned by Viktor Medvedchuk — Russia's top choice to lead a puppet government if Kyiv fell. His channels were 100% Russian propaganda.

Third, many Trump associates have condemned the banning of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the Moscow Patriarchate (UOC-MP). The Russian Orthodox Church, led by KGB agent Vladimir Gundyayev, functions as an extension of Russian intelligence agencies.







The FBI suspected an employee of the Russian Orthodox Church of recruiting agents for Russian intelligence services in the United States

The US Federal Bureau of Investigation suspected Dmitry Petrovsky, an employee of the Moscow Patriarchate's Department of External Church Relations, of working for Russian intelligence.

The FBI believes that Petrovsky, under the cover of the Russian Orthodox Church, was engaged in recruiting agents for Russian intelligence services among priests and parishioners of the Russian Orthodox Church and other Orthodox churches in the United States.

In May 2021, Petrovsky was searched upon entering the United States. Files related to Russian intelligence were found on his computer. Among the documents found were dossiers on well-known Orthodox priests in the US with details of biographies of their family members. The FBI believed that such information was necessary for Petrovsky to blackmail these people during the recruitment process.


One of the files found was marked "confidential." The FBI cited it in full in its warning. Thus, according to the agency, this document contained a description of the areas of cooperation between the Russian Orthodox Church and the Russian special services - SVR, GRU and FSB.





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












Fifth, MAGA Republicans now accuse Zelenskyy of "murdering journalists," referencing the case of Gonzalo Lira. Lira was a violent criminal propagandist who violated the Article 463-2 of Ukraine's criminal code, and died of pneumonia after years of smoking two packs a day.



Specifically, SPRAVDI said that Lira had justified the Russian attack by falsely claiming the Ukrainian government was a neo-Nazi regime and denied "massacres of civilian Ukrainians by Russian invaders in Bucha and other cities." SPRAVDI added that Lira filmed himself insulting Ukrainian soldiers before publishing the footage on social media.

On April 3, 2022, Ukraine's Prosecutor General Iryna Venediktova said the bodies of 410 civilians had been recovered from Bucha, a town on the outskirts of Kyiv, and neighboring settlements following the retreat of Russian troops. Taras Shapravskyi, speaker of the Bucha City Council, told *Newsweek*: "We have official data confirming the deaths of 422 civilians at the hands of the Russian occupiers."

Posting on X, formerly Twitter, in July, <u>Lira said he was "arrested for my YouTube videos,"</u> adding: "My crime was making videos critical of the West and their proxy regime in Kiev—and how they are destroying Ukraine."

Lira added that he was tortured in prison by other inmates, which saw him beaten and sleep-deprived, with his "arms twisted the wrong way around at the shoulder."

These allegations were strenuously denied by Sarah Ashton-Cirillo, a former American journalist who became a sergeant in the Ukrainian army, in an interview with *Business Insider*. Ashton-Cirillo said: "In an effort to gain sympathy, Gonzalo Lira made up allegations of abuse and torture. As someone who spoke to him shortly after he was returned to custody, it was clear that he was in good health and treated extremely fairly by the state security services."

Other fake stories are circulating too, mainly spreading doom and gloom about Ukraine's situation. These have been thoroughly debunked by @TheStudyofWar in their Ukraine fact sheet:

Key Takeaways:

Tracking how these narratives infiltrate MAGA circles is easy – they mainly originate from two sources: Douglas Macgregor and Tucker Carlson. Macgregor is a former US military officer who, at some point, decided to start rooting for Russia.





Macgregor has been consistently wrong about Ukraine since day one of the full-scale invasion, yet people still take him seriously. Unsurprisingly, Russian state media frequently cite him:



Most of you already know Tucker Carlson and probably remember how he was humiliated by Putin, or how he was astonished to find fresh bread in a French supermarket in Moscow. For years now, he's been busy laundering Russian lies into social media.






Many of the major lies now being spread by Trump and his associates originated from Tucker's show on X. For example, Bob Amsterdam, who has been pushing Russian


narratives and who was working for Russian oligarch Vadym Novynskyi, has appeared on Tucker's show twice.







There are other sources of Russian disinformation, too. AI-generated fake news sites have been spreading lies for years. One of the masterminds behind these networks is an American

For example, the indictment said Afanasyeva told the company to blame Ukraine for a March terrorist attack on a Moscow concert hall, even though ISIS had claimed responsibility. The company's founder said one of the contributors was "happy to cover it."

Afanasyeva also allegedly requested that the company post a video of "a well-known U.S. political commentator visiting a grocery store in Russia" — likely a reference to former Fox News host Tucker Carlson, who traveled to Moscow in February. According to the indictment, a producer at the company told one of the founders "it just feels like overt shilling" but was told to "put it out there."

Afanasyeva also urged the influencers to share the company's videos on their own channels and got annoyed when she didn't think they were promoting them enough, according to the indictment.

The Russians allegedly grew frustrated that the influencers focused too much on promoting their own social media brands, rather than Tenet Media. "At least one share per day. Not one share per week," one of the RT employees ordered. To add more pressure, the RT employee invented a second fake persona that echoed the same demands in the influencers' group chat. Later, arguments formed about whether to post a video of Tucker Carlson visiting a Russian grocery store, where he marveled at coin-operated carts as if they were an advanced form of technology. "They want me to publish this," Pool wrote in an internal chat. But "it just feels like overt shilling."

Russia and the Trump administration are also focusing on attacking America's former allies in Europe while manipulating US elections through social media. Russia's goal is to polarize Western societies and fuel internal division.



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

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

Trump to abandon Russia war crimes prosecution

Washington signals end to pursuit of Putin as third anniversary of Ukraine invasion looms











The US has signalled that it could leave an international effort to prosecute Russia for invading Ukraine, The Telegraph can reveal.

US envoys refused to label Russia as an "aggressor" at a meeting of a "core group" of countries preparing a Nuremberg-style tribunal to try Vladimir Putin for his war crimes, according to Western officials.

Washington is similarly refusing to co-sponsor a United Nations statement that supports Ukraine's territorial integrity and demands Moscow to withdraw its forces from the war-torn nation.

Mr Trump's administration has also refused to sign off a planned G7 statement calling Russia the "aggressor" in the war with Ukraine to mark the third anniversary of the conflict on Monday.

The US president has blamed Ukraine for starting the war, branded Volodymyr Zelensky a "dictator" and pushed for Russia to be invited back to the alliance of industrialised nations.

European officials fear Mr Trump's flattery of Putin could lead to the Russian despot being let off the hook for his invasion as part of any peace settlement.






