

In today's Vatnik Soup, I'll introduce American propagandist Alexandra Jost, aka "Sasha" (@sashameetsrus). She's best known for being paid by the Russian state to spread pro-Kremlin propaganda — and for doing it with a big smile.

Alexandra, now 26, was born in Hong Kong. Her father is from Texas, and her mother is from Siberia. According to her, she has "dreamed of living in Russia since childhood." Sasha's mother runs a dance studio in Moscow and her younger brother is avoiding mobilization.

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Many foreign citizens strive to move to Russia. For them, the country is a Noah's Ark and the last stronghold of traditional values. This was stated during the thematic programme "Platform of the Future: 100 Projects of Russia" at the National Centre RUSSIA by Russian-American blogger Alexandra Jost.


"My father is from Texas, my mother is from Siberia, but since childhood I have dreamed of living in Russia. Three years ago my dream came true: I not only moved here but also persuaded my whole family to move to Russia, including my American father. And we are not the only ones. In fact, now many foreigners want to move to Russia and even do so. They see this country as a kind of Noah's Ark, as the last stronghold of traditional values, which no longer exist in the West, "said Alexandra Jost.

She stressed that for her it has always been a mission to show Russia as it is, in a way that foreign citizens have never seen it.

"Now hundreds of thousands of people online are watching this. Moving to Russia was the best decision of my life. I love this country, I have a Russian soul, and I see Russia as a land of opportunity. Everyone talks about the American Dream, but in fact I believe that there is also a Russian Dream. I believe in our future, in Russia as a country of opportunities and prospects, "she emphasised.




Since the beginning of her creator career, Sasha has been adamant about one thing: that she's "never had to be paid" to speak of her "love" for Russia. But, as always with Russia, this turned out to be nothing but vranyo — a Russian "tactical lie."



Over the past week I ha 11 April lany info agents who have been scrambling for their last USAID pennies writing nasty things about me in their yellow press. First, I would like to say that I've never had to be paid to speak of my love for Russia. I have been a patriot of Russia and have defended the truth about this country since I could talk. According to the Russian investigative outlet iStories, Jost has been on the payroll of Russian state media TV Novosti. Her 2023 tax data showed she was paid about \$2,000 per month, though there's a good chance she also received bonuses ("nadbavki").




As previously reported by Novaya Gazeta Europe, Jost also receives funding from RT, which she has never disclosed. Reporters from iStories have obtained a document showing that her payments averaged 170,000 rubles (\$2,000) per month in the first three quarters of 2024. Jost did not respond to requests for comment.

On occasion, she and her fellow RT-supported influencers have covered the same story. In May 2024, Jost published a video covering a display of dozens of "war trophy" Western tanks, captured during the war, in Moscow's Victory Park.

Lipp, "Russian Code," and "Real Reporter" all covered the display as well. It became one of Real Reporter's most successful videos, gathering 3.7 million views.

Alexandra's content has high production value, and her videos have performed relatively well across various platforms. Most of her social media output revolves around one idea: portraying Russia in a positive light for foreigners while encouraging them to emigrate there.



At first, she claimed to be "apolitical" and mostly produced romanticized videos about life in Russia and the "Russian soul" — you know, the kind that conveniently avoid showing the poverty, violence, and other grim realities deeply embedded in Russian society.









After being exposed as a paid propagandist, Jost's social media channels disappeared from YouTube, Instagram, and TikTok. As is tradition, the fan of the authoritarian dictatorship complained about "censorship," even though these platforms clearly prohibit state propaganda.

Banned on most platforms, Sasha finally found her home on Elon Musk's X. She quickly garnered a fervent following — and even started talking politics! Suddenly, the "apolitical" travel vlogger had plenty to say about Ukraine and Ukrainians.








Over time — perhaps following instructions from her handlers — she began addressing geopolitics and especially the Russo-Ukrainian War, mainly targeting American audiences by

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
In high school (2014), some Ukrainian "journalists" came to spread their misinformation to an auditorium full of naive students. Little did they know I was there, and I knew the truth. So I started questioning them in Russian, in front of everyone. You should have seen the look on their faces, they were too stunned to speak. They came to a small U.S. town, thinking they could slowly poison the minds of young Americans. They didn't think one of those Americans also happened to be Russian. This goes to show that since 2014, Ukraine has tried to manipulate Americans (even teens!) with their propaganda.







In that sense, Sasha is like any other online vatnik, offering an extremely biased, one-sided view of current and past events. But what's more relevant than her commentary is the soft-power propaganda she's been producing in recent years.





With Russia, everything is a lie — a Potemkin façade. Her job is to sell this façade to naive English-speaking audiences, creating the illusion of a conservative, spiritual, and traditional country that values family. Of course, nothing could be further from the truth.



As we saw with Tucker Carlson's trip to Moscow, Russia maintains a few polished urban centers, often featured in propaganda shots of metro stations, churches & other fancy buildings. These are then contrasted with poorer or unrestful regions of the West — especially the US.











Of course, this framing is completely unreal. Russia is the worst of the developed world in poor sanitation: about 23% of Russians live without a centralized sewage system, and 6% lack any sewage system at all. In rural areas, roughly two-thirds have no indoor toilets.



Alexandra promotes Russian "family values," often showcasing photos of her own close-knit family — yet Russia has one of the highest divorce rates in the world. Domestic violence is rampant, but the problem was conveniently "solved" by decriminalizing it.







Russia parliament votes 380-3 to decriminalize domestic violence



Russia's parliament voted 380-3 on Friday to decriminalize domestic violence in cases where it does not cause "substantial bodily harm" and does not occur more than once a year.

The move, which eliminates criminal liability in such cases, makes a violation punishable by a fine of roughly \$500, or a 15-day arrest, provided there is no repeat within 12 months.

The bill now goes to the rubber-stamp upper chamber, where no opposition is expected. It then must be signed by President Vladimir Putin, who has signaled his support.

When it comes to spirituality, the picture is equally bleak: only about 9% of Russians attend church monthly, the Russian Orthodox Church has been entangled with intelligence services since Soviet times (it's even led by a "former" KGB agent), and Russia bombs churches.







The Russian authorities have reportedly given a state award to a convicted pedophile who was recruited into the army directly from prison. Ilya Belostotsky, a former children's TV show director convicted of sexually assaulting a minor in 2022, announced Monday that he had received a medal "for saving lives" while serving in the Russian army in Ukraine.

"Under Russian law, I am exempt from punishment and my criminal record has been expunged," Belostotsky told the news site msk1.ru. "Friends, rejoice - opponents, gnash your teeth."


Belostotsky was unsure of the exact reason for his nomination but suggested it might be related to saving a commander in battle. "If I ever get leave, I'll go to our unit's headquarters in Russia — that's where the decree for the award is and then I'll find out for sure," he said.

The lawyer representing the aggrieved party in Belostotsky's trial told msk1.ru that her clients have no intention of appealing his release.

Research did not find evidence of laws or regulations to criminalize possessing child pornography or benefiting from its proceeds. In November 2014, the Criminal Law Committee of the State Duma recommended the adoption of a 2012 draft law that would define child pornography and criminalize its possession. (24-26) However, the law was not adopted during the reporting period. (27)

Sasha has also criticized the state of free speech in the UK — while failing to mention that in Russia, you can be arrested for holding a blank piece of paper. The state has murdered hundreds of journalists, and Russia now ranks 155th out of 180 in the Press Freedom Index.









While Sasha smiles about the charms of rural Russia, the same Russia is sending wave after wave of men, especially from minorities, to die in muddy trenches in Ukraine. Those who survive often return traumatized and violent, committing serious crimes upon their return.





When Sasha roams fancy supermarkets in Moscow claiming that "Western sanctions have no effect," she forgets that a significant share of Russians live in poverty, and many mothers send their sons to die in pointless wars just so that their families can afford food.



Old Age in Poverty: 76 % of russians Are Convinced that Their Pensions Will Not Be Enough to Live on

In modern russia, one's pension is not a guarantee of a dignified old age, but rather a symbol of poverty and survival. Only 17 % of russians believe that state payments will be enough for a normal life, while the vast majority (76 %) are convinced of the opposite.

In order not to be left below the poverty line, cussians are forced to think about saving while they are still young: 30 % believe that one needs to start saving money for old age before the age of 25. One in four considers the optimal period to be 25-35 years of age, and another 14 % considit to be 36-45.

Al this, two-thirds of respondents (65 %) are already planning additional ways to earn money in reterement. Among them, 40 % are preparing for easy manual work, 32 % want to continue working with only profession, and 28 % count only on their own savings. Some people openly plan to feed themselves with produce from their own vegetable gardens (27 %) or hope for high print with children (15%).


mp of the state duma from funited russia. Initial contina has advised pensioners to "become independent and no longer rely on the state, because a pension is just an "old-age assistance", not a full-fledged income.

In russia, pensions do not guarantee a secure and prosperous old age. For most people, retirement is not the beginning of a well-deserved rest, but a new stage in the struggle for survival.



Sasha insists "Russians are not the enemy." Yet since 1990, Russia has invaded Moldova, Chechnya (twice), Georgia, and Ukraine, all while waging hybrid war on the West. In reality, Russia is the greatest threat to liberal democracy today.







To conclude: Sasha's main mission is to whitewash Russia's genocidal war on Ukraine & its grim reality of war crimes & brutal occupation with state-funded, feel-good videos.

She may fool a few gullible viewers, but no amount of smiling and dancing can hide the ugly truth.

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
