In *Foreign Policy*, Kishore Mahbubani, a distinguished fellow at the Asia Research Institute of the National University of Singapore, recently returned to an argument he has long been making: The U.S. should accept that it cannot stop China's rise, not least because efforts to do so are hurting the U.S. far more than they are harming China.

Unfortunately, however, the U.S. appears constitutionally incapable of heeding such sage advice: Like a psychotic, it seems unable to deal with realities of the sort Mahbubani is pointing to.

Earlier she called Biden's characterisation of Putin as a war criminal to be "egregious" and laid the whole blame on the U.S. Let that sink in: she masquerades as a scholar and is employed with full tenure by a Western university.

U.S. President Joe Biden called Russian President Vladimir Putin a "war criminal" on March 16 and the Kremlin, swiftly and understandably, called this "unacceptable and unforgivable." Egregious though it is, the most important thing about that statement may be its timing.

This isn't a matter of academic freedom or free speech any more than it would be if someone glorified Hitler and wrote pieces on how he wanted peace but his treacherous enemies attacked him. Western academic institutions are used as a safe haven for such people.
