He's best-known for supporting and spreading pro-Kremlin narratives on the Russo-Ukrainian War.





...company, has framed Russia's invasion of Ukraine since the Revolution of Dignity took place in 2014.

For example, recently this state-funded public broadcaster became under scrutiny for showing fake news:

Almost 70% of Austrians follow ORF's radio coverage, and their website boasts with over 120 million monthly visits. ORF's reporting might be one of the reasons why Austria's pro-Russia sentiment is on the rise, and right-wing, pro-Kremlin parties like FPÖ lead the polls.







Wehrschütz started his media career back in the 80s, when he contributed to the Austrian far-right magazine Die Aula. Later he was the editor of "Neue Freie Zeitung," the official publication of FPÖ. Wehrschütz was also member of FPÖ until 2002.





Wehrschütz turns his back on the FPÖ

In 2002 he turned away from the FPÖ. The ORF correspondent justified his resignation from the party by saying that it had not met his expectations. In the summer of 2021 he ran for the post of ORF Director General. However, <u>Alexander Wrabetz</u> was succeeded by <u>Roland Weißmann</u>.

He worked as a part-time correspondent in Kyiv, and his controversial takes started already in 2014, when he published a book called "Brennpunkt Ukraine". In it, he claimed that "there was, of course, an organization that someone financed" the Revolution of Dignity.



This same claim, without a shred of evidence, has come from filmmakers like Igor Lopatonok, whose propaganda piece "Ukraine on Fire" provided us a very one-sided image of what happened in Ukraine in 2014:



On 20 Feb 2014, he blamed the violence in Kyiv to the "extreme opposition", saying that they've sent snipers on the scene. He somehow forgot to mention the Berkut snipers, the paid "Titushky" thugs & the constant meddling of pro-Russian actors in his "balanced" report.




Later, in 2022, he doubled-down on his claims, insisting on the "correctness" of his reporting and self-praising his ability to "draw a far more differentiated picture than was offered by the usual Maidan reporting," that he called "a one-sided good/evil scheme"





After Russia illegally annexed Crimea and parts of the Donbas, Wehrschütz called the latter "pro-Russian rebel republics". As we now know from the Surkov and Glazeyev leaks, these sentiments were largely fabricated by the Kremlin propagandists and businessmen.

Purportedly Leaked Document 'Shows Kremlin Had Advance Plan To Seize Crimea'







The Russian daily newspaper Novaya Gazeta has published a plan — allegedly given to the Kremlin two weeks before President Viktor Yanukovych was ousted last year — calling for Russia to "foment separatism" in eastern Ukraine and seize Crimea.

The February 25 edition of the newspaper showed a copy of the memo, which suggested a series of steps Russia should take to maintain control over the situation in Ukraine

The newspaper said the memo was prepared sometime between February 4 and 12, 2014, and alleges ultranationalist Russian oligarch Konstantin Malofeev might have been behind it, a charge Malofeev denies.

The memo says Ukrainian oligarchs had lost control of the situation on Kyiv's Maidan Square and that the leaders of demonstrations there were being guided by "Polish and British secret services."

The memo predicted Yanukovych's fall and said Russia should use the EU's own rules on autonomous regions to bind Crimea and eastern Ukraine to Russia.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov suggested the memo is fake

In Feb 2015, he stated in an interview that "It is clear Putin is no longer interested in aggravating the conflict because it involves extremely high costs." Before this interview, he was awarded with Austria's coveted "Journalist of the Year" for his "balanced" journalism. 11/20

Angela Merkel has explicitly praised Putin's role in the Minsk negotiations. Do you see a small rapprochement between Russia and the EU, even if the agreed ceasefire on Saturday afternoon wobbled?

What is clear is that Putin no longer has any interest in escalating the conflict because it is associated with extremely high costs. On the one hand there are the sanctions, but on the other hand there is also the devastating social situation of the people in the pro-Russian regions. Since Ukraine has stopped paying pensions and all social benefits, these regions are dependent on Russia . Because I find it difficult to play autonomy with ruins. One point that has a lot to do with the future is the agreement on an economic area from the Atlantic to the Pacific . This offers the EU a roof to cushion Ukraine 's EU rapprochement by allowing Russiaincluded in the economic area.

Christian Wehrschütz is Austria's "Journalist of the Year"






In Dec 2018, the Ukrainian authorities refused to renew his authorization to work in the front line area in Donbas. At the same time, he claimed to be in danger and threatened by Ukraine's "militant, ultra-nationalist groups". He also demanded a diplomatic intervention.



ORF journalist turns to Austrian government for help over threats in Ukraine


Christian Verschutz said he fears for his life in Ukraine

VIENNA, 26 December. /TASS/. Christian Verschutz, a journalist and reporter for the Austrian television and radio company ORF in Ukraine, said he feared for his life in this country. He called on the Austrian government and the leadership of the ORF to influence the Ukrainian government to stop building obstacles to journalistic work, the $\underline{\text{Kronen}}$ Zeitung writes on Wednesday .

"There are paramilitary, ultra-nationalist groups operating in Ukraine that threaten journalists who critically cover the politics of the Ukrainian leadership and try to maintain objectivity. Two journalists have already been killed, I don't want to be next," Werschütz wrote in a message to ORF CEO and the Austrian federal government. - I persistently ask the leadership of the ORF and representatives of the Republic of Austria to make a presentation to Ukraine and its representation in Austria."


The journalist urged the Austrian authorities to remove the entry about himself on the Ukrainian page on the Internet "Posipaka - Agent of the Kremlin." In addition, he called on Ukraine to stop its nit-picking. "I point out that in Ukraine there is a physical threat not only for me, but also for my employees," Kronen Zeitung cites excerpts from Verschutz's message.

In his coverage of the media situation in Ukraine, the ORF reporter previously pointed out that his film crew was being denied accreditation by the Kyiv authorities. At the same time, there have been too many obstacles to doing journalistic work in Ukraine lately. "The countries of the EU and the US know about it, but they are silent. The silence of the lambs must be stopped," the Austrian journalist urged.



In March 2019, despite the Austrian government and Kneissl lobbying hard on his behalf, Christian faced a ban on entering Ukraine, which he protested in a Kyiv court. His lawyer, Maryna Parinova, allegedly has connections to Yanukovych's old administration.

Wehrschütz has also written for Austria's biggest tabloid called "Kronen Zeitung," in which he has warned about "escalation" & criticized the weapons deliveries to Ukraine. @Wehrschu,do you agree that this "diplomacy" should include Russia leaving Ukraine, including Crimea?

The reporter talks about the situation in Ukraine: "The war has become part of everyday life. In cities like Kiev, the bomb alarm is sometimes no longer taken seriously." He describes how likely it really is that Russian gas supplies to the West will be stopped and gives his assessment of the further course of the war: "The Russians, who were repeatedly declared dead , advancing slowly but surely. What bothers me is that the West is primarily discussing further arms deliveries to Ukraine. The means of diplomacy have receded far too far into the background. There is no end in sight to this war." The 60-year-old journalist also talks about his everyday life during the war: "I've never been afraid because fear is a bad advisor. When things get tricky, you have to stay calm and think: 'How do I get out of there?" Wehrschütz also tells Ö3 for the first time how the Chancellor's visit saved his life: "Actually, I was supposed to be shooting at a Kramatorsk train station that day, but because of Nehammer's visit to Ukraine, I had to Lecture changed my plans. In regard to Bucha, he questioned "whether all the corpses lying around there have really been victims of Russian war crimes." He continued that "The pictures from Bucha are terrible - but the hypocrisy of the West and its failed policies of the past 30 years are terrible."

Wehrschütz: Not comparable to Sebrenica

ORF correspondent Christian Wehrschütz is cautious in assessing the atrocities in Butscha and does not yet want to speak of a massacre. "An international investigation would be very appropriate," said Wehrschütz in the Ö1 morning journal. It is questionable "whether really all the people who were lying around there" became victims of Russian war crimes. There was massive fighting in this place for the first few days and the Russians were shot there". Wehrschütz also believes that the atrocities will have consequences. "In fact, nothing can happen, because Russia is a nuclear power and does not recognize international jurisdiction."

Wehrschütz also commented on the atrocities on Facebook: understanding everything does not mean forgiving everything! But anyone who, because of his addiction to conspiracy theories (Russia as an example) and total hysteria (the West as pars pro toto) does not even try to understand the other side, should not forget that we need a solution for Ukraine, let's not go there completely uncontrollable situations (use of tactical nuclear weapons by Russia as an example). The pictures from Buscha are terrible - but the hypocrisy of the West and its failed policies of the past 30 years are terrible."


Christian Wehrschütz' statements caused a stir on Twitter. Numerous users accuse the ORF correspondent of Russia-friendly reporting.



Some weeks later, he he did "not yet want to speak of a massacre", because of they, in his opinion, were used for "influencing public opinion". Later, when the overwhelming evidence of Russian atrocities came to light, he asked that "who is still talking about Bucha today?" 18/20



Ukrainian Ambassador to Austria, Vasyl Khymynets, was later outraged by Wehrschütz's comments on Izium mass graves. He said that Russian war crimes could not be verified and added that "we should not forget about the media and information war."





Almost all the bodies exhumed from mass graves in the recently liberated city of Izyum in Ukraine's **Kharkiv** region show clear evidence of torture including violent castrations, investigators have declared.

Ukraine's First Deputy Minister of Internal Affairs Yevheny Yenin spoke of the horrendous treatment murdered civilians endured before their deaths in a harrowing admission to news site **Suspilne** yesterday.


'We continue to find bodies with signs of violent death - there are many of them,' Yenin said.

'These include broken ribs and cracked skulls, men with bound hands, broken jaws,

Allegedly, Mr. Wehrschütz has hired a group of high-profile lawyers who are known to sue everyone in Austria he deems even a slight threat to his reputation as an "objective" reporter.
